Nothing lasts forever. There comes a time when something is just too old, too worn out to be used effectively. This is true of flags, as well. But most people don't know what to do with flags when they become worn out, faded, or torn. They often end up in a closet somewhere, collecting dust.



Our founding fathers realized that flags do not last forever, and devised a ceremony for the respectful retirement of these great symbols of America. The ceremony includes readings of the symbolism present in the flag and draping them across a cleansing fire.

You can maintain your flag in good condition by keeping it in a cool, dry place, away from insects and animals. Never let it touch the ground. Not only is this disrespectful, but dirt hurts the flag.

How to tell if it's time to retire your flag:

- Is it ripped or torn?
- Is it faded?
- Is it stained or dirty?
- Is it getting frayed?
- Does it have moth holes or insect damage?

Proper storage can greatly prolong the life of a flag. There is a traditional manner of folding flags, shown below.
